Plagiarism is ...



**the unacknowledged use
of someone else's work
as if it were your own.**

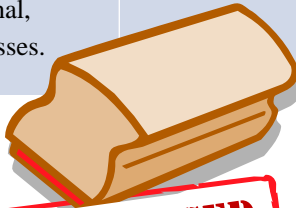


The following text comes from Simpson, B. (2009) 'Pragmatism, Mead and the Practice Turn', **Organization Studies**, 30(12): 1329-1347:

For the pragmatists, living implies active and reflexive engagement in the transactions that constitute experience ... Practice then, is the conduct of transactional life, which involves the temporally-unfolding, symbolically-mediated interweaving of experience and action. This definition of practice evokes a dynamic and emergent process that sustains routines while also admitting possibilities for creative action. A key implication of this is that the outcomes of practice cannot be predicted in a teleological sense. Rather, they are enactments of the future that emerge as actors anticipate the likely outcomes of their social actions. These anticipatory acts shape actors' choices regarding their ongoing conduct, and ultimately shape their worlds as well.

A second key implication of this pragmatist perspective is that practice and identity are co-constituting processes. That is, actors derive their meaning, significance and sense of self through their transactional engagements ... The process of constructing identity is, therefore, intimately associated with this notion of practice, but current trends in the organization studies literature tend to locate practice and identity as distinct and separate sub-fields. The pragmatic perspective offers a potentially more fruitful approach that sees both identity and practice as co-constituting, transactional, meaning-making processes.

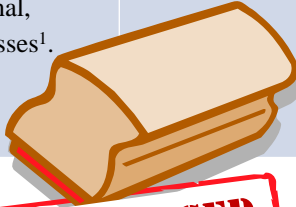

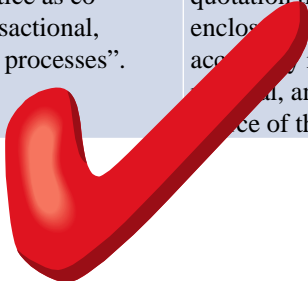
Student	Commentary
For the pragmatists, practice and identity are not distinct sub-fields, but rather they are co-constituting processes of meaning-making.	Paraphrasing without acknowledgement is still plagiarism



Student	Commentary
“actors derive their meaning, significance and sense of self through practice” (Simpson, 2009)	The quotation marks indicate a verbatim copy of the original, but the quote is not correct.



Student	Commentary
Far from separating practice and identity into separate constructs, Simpson (2009: 1338) “sees both identity and practice as co-constituting, transactional, meaning-making processes”.	The writer begins with a statement in her/his own words and follows this up with a direct quotation that is correctly enclosed in quotation marks, accurately reproduces the original text, and correctly cites the source of the quotation.



Turnitin

- Plagiarism software used widely in the University sector
- Checks your work against an ever-expanding array of online sources
- Reports a ‘Similarity Score’ and produces an ‘Originality’ report
